


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Why Art on the Trail?



Dam Warnings

- Floating barrel sculptures will individually turn in the river's current ahead of unmarked dams
- Upstream paddles will present warnings to canoeists, downstream paddles—poems facing pedestrian and vehicle bridges.

- 10 buoys to go across the Missisquoi River at unmarked dam in Swanton, VT

- Project could be replicated in other Trail communities.










Stone Canoes


- Design workshops looked at incorporation of canoe put-in in park
